We will then spend some time looking at the beliefs of the Catholics and Protestants at this time, before moving on to why Henry VIII broke with Rome. Topics will include: Henry VIII as a young man Why did Henry VIII break with Rome? What were the consequences of the break with Rome? Did Henry VIII get what he wanted?

Pupils will examine portraits of Elizabeth I and discuss their symbolism and make links between the portraits and events at the time. Pupils will study the events of the Spanish Armada, the issue of Elizabeth's marriage and how Elizabeth dealt with the problem of the poor.
