We met at 4:30am at Newcastle airport. We flew with Jet 2. After going through security, we could spend some money on snacks and drinks for the

plane. Our flight was at 7:00. We arrived at the airport in Grenoble at 10:30 and took a coach the rest of the way. The coach ride was 2 hours! We arrived at the hotel, La Vallee Blanche, 13:45 and left our bags in our hotel rooms. We then went and got our skis, boots and helmets fitted. In the evening, we had a village orientation.

Our first day of skiing was very exciting. We took the bucket lifts from our hotel to the mountain. When we arrived at the mountain, we met our instructors. There were four groups: three beginner groups and one advanced group. We then split into our groups. The instructors were called Remy, Coco and Niko. On the first day, we learned how to snow-plough, sidestep and move up a hill. Over the next few days, we went on various slopes and learnt different techniques. Personally, our favourite technique was skiing backwards, even though it was a little daunting at first.

After skiing, we had the opportunity to go into the village. There were quite a few shops: a Spar, a pharmacy, some souvenir shops, a pizza shop and a crepe shop. We went into the Spar lots because there was lots of stuff to buy. When we got back, we could go to our rooms, hang with our friends, play snooker or get a drink from the bar.

The food was delicious. Every day, we woke up at seven o'clock and breakfast was at quarter past seven. There was cereal, pastry, yoghurts and several different juices on offer. Lunch was after we got back from skiing at quarter to twelve and there was always a choice of soup, baguettes, fruit and a salad bar. Dinner was served at half past six and every night it was different. Some of the different meals included; macaroni cheese, pasta bake, burgers and fish and chips. There was also a different dessert every night.

We interviewed a few people who went on the trip: Jaymie, Lucy, Tilly, Eva, Emma and Sophie H. Here is what we found:

The most popular slope was 'Marcel's Farm'. This was a green slope with lots of moguls, tunnels, jumps and turns designed for children like us. 








Talented Tiny Tale Tellers

HOLOCAUST MEMORIAL Day



The Holocaust was the genocide of European Jews during World War II. Between 1941 and 1945, Nazi Germany and its collaborators systematically murdered some six million Jews across German-occupied Europe, around twothirds of Europe's Jewish population. We remember this event by holding a holocaust Memorial Day concert on the 28th January 2024 on Sunday in the Newcastle city library. Children from GEMS, Dame Allens, Newcastle School for Boys and other school will gather with Fiona (the creator of the song we will sing) and rehearse, get chosen for either tune or harmony and sing in front of many people.

THE EVENT

We went two days ago with the rest of choir club with Mr Williams to the Newcastle City Library for rehearsal and the real thing on stage. There were many people in the audience including the mayor of Newcastle. There were several speakers who spoke about how their families were affected by the Holocaust. We sang a newly composed song called 'fragility of Freedom'. It was specially written for this year's Memorial Day. This song explored the theme of freedom and focused on the lack of freedom suffered by the Jews in the Holocaust.
